*The Leader Your Family Will Remember Long After You Are Gone*

## TOOL 7 — Your Legacy Worksheet

### PART 1 — KEY CONCEPT COMPREHENSION

*This module teaches that every man leaves a legacy. The question is never whether you will leave one — it is whether you will be intentional about what it says. Legacies are built in ordinary moments, not grand ones. Answer based on what you read.*

1. The module says your family does not need a flawless father — they need a faithful one. A man who fails, owns it, repents, and keeps moving forward teaches his children something success alone never could. What has your response to your own failures taught your children so far?

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2. The covenant you keep with your wife is the most visible demonstration of your character your children will ever witness. What does your marriage currently demonstrate to your children about what commitment, love, and covenant look like?

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3. The module says multi-generational impact requires playing the long game — decisions you make today will shape people you will never meet. What generational pattern are you currently passing on — and is it one you chose intentionally or inherited by default?

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4. Research confirms a father's values and relational patterns are transmitted across at least three generations. A man who breaks a destructive generational cycle does not just change his family — he changes his bloodline. What cycle are you called to break? What would breaking it cost you?
